In 3-6 Literacy, students have been busy writing a description of their chosen animal/creature. We have watched and learnt from Steve Backshall in Deadly 60 to assist us with our descriptions. The following are examples of the work.

Red Strawberry poison dart frogs

As its name states the red strawberry poison dart frog is red with black spots and is categorized as an amphibian. They are highly deadly and is the 8th most poisonous dart frog in the world.

Habitat and Diet

The red strawberry poison dart lives in the tropical rainforests of south and central America. It also lives on hawaiian islands such as maui located in the central Pacific ocean. Its diet consist of mainly insects. It uses its tongue to capture its food. Adults can consume up to 14 prey every hour.



Lifespan and Predators

This frog can live up to 10 years or more in captivity. However in the wild they can live up 15 years this is because this frog only has one predator the night ground snake. Night ground snakes are immune to the toxins of this frog this means that night ground snakes can kill and eat strawberry poison dart frogs without dying. This frog is truly immune to almost every animal trying to kill/eat it except for the night ground snake which unlike any other animal is capable of eating this frog.

Brown Goshawk

The brown goshawk is found in Australia and it is a raptor means a large bird of pray. They lay 4 eggs and both parents protect the nest aggressively while the eggs are hatching.

The size of a brown goshawk is 55cm tall the large male can get to 350g.

They eat rabbits, lizards, mice, rats, and snakes.

Their habitat is the bush and forest of Australia.



Eastern brown snake

Eastern Brown Snake.

The Eastern Brown Snake is the second most poisonous snake in the world. It is very deadly. If you are bitten, you may die. It grows up to 2 metres. The snake lays 10-35 eggs in spring.

They live in Eastern areas of Australia. They are usually orange or brown and the belly has orange marks. They can move as fast as a man can run. The males are bigger than the females. The brown snake is not endangered. They eat frogs, birds, small mammals, other snakes, rats and mice.



Wedge Tail Eagle.

Australia's largest bird of prey. They feed on rabbits and rats.

They are a legally protected species. In 1999 there was less than 200 pairs left in the wild.

The life span is 5 or 6 years they may live up to 40 years. They live all over Australia and parts of New Guinea. They have a wing span of 2.3m. They lays 1 to 2 eggs. They are 6 ft height. By Layne
